The CC Jazz Ensembles routinely work and perform with clinicians and guest artists throughout the academic year and during the Kinser Jazz Festival. History


The Casper College Kinser Jazz Festival, now in its 55th year, is named for the late Dr. Thomas Kinser, who founded the festival and promoted jazz as a standard component of music study in Wyoming. In 1967, the festival hosted three ensembles. Today, the festival has grown to accommodate nearly 50 ensembles, including college, high school, and junior high school instrumental and vocal ensembles.

The festival's mission statement is: "The Casper College Kinser Jazz Festival exists to provide world-class jazz and jazz education to the current and future generations of musicians in the Rocky Mountain region. Our focus is to present authentic jazz performances by artists of the highest caliber and to offer a variety of educational experiences for jazz ensembles, their directors, and the public at large." The clinicians provide written comments, a rating, and a custom work session for each ensemble to help improve future performances. Regularly scheduled seminars, workshops, and performances are offered to expose festival attendees to high quality jazz performance and education.

The highlight of the festival is the evening concert featuring Randy Brecker, Eric Marienthal, and Kris Berg's Metroplexity Big Band. In past years, jazz greats Dizzy Gillespie, Betty Carter, The Manhattan Transfer, Airto Moreira, Flora Purim, Ellis Marsalis, Clark Terry, Kurt Elling, Russell Malone, Arturo Sandoval, and Gordon Goodwin's Big Phat Band have been headliner artists. These artists have performed for and worked with students from across Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, North Dakota, Utah, and Montana.

Due largely to Kinser's passion, Casper College has a strong tradition of excellence in the area of jazz. The program provides students with an excellent beginning and continuation to their jazz careers. Because Casper College is a two-year college, students are provided excellent scholarships and financial resources, and enjoy solo opportunities and leadership roles typically available only to upperclassmen and graduate students.

The jazz program at Casper College has provided a solid start for generations of musicians. To date, we can confirm three generations of Wyoming instructors who have brought their students to our festival to perform and we are rapidly anticipating the fourth generation. While on campus for the festival, students who are interested in attending Casper College may arrange to audition for scholarships by speaking with any of our faculty and performing a short, private audition.

Adjudicators



Dana Landry is always pursuing the next artistic challenge. He is as at home playing Bebop with a jazz quartet as he is performing Prokofiev with an orchestra, as comfortable playing duo in a small dive as he is accompanying a diva in a concert hall. He has been performing regularly with the Colorado Symphony Orchestra for the past twelve years as part of Classical and Pops series.

Dana is featured on recordings released by record labels including Summit, Origin, and Artist Alliance, several of which made it to the top of the Jazz Week U.S. Radio Airplay Chart. His first CD as a leader, Journey Home, featured

virtuoso vibist Gary Burton. Landry has performed throughout the U.S. and in Europe, Australia, and China.

Landry has held the position of Director of Jazz Studies at the University of Northern Colorado since 2002, where he directs the award-winning UNC Jazz Lab Band I. Their most recent release is the Romeo and Juliet Project, a Jazz Orchestra suite based on Shakespeare's most famous work. In April of 2021, they premiered An Electronic Wonderland, which combines big band and electronica and is inspired by Alice's Adventures in Wonderland.

Composer and saxophonist, Wil Swindler Currently resides near Denver, CO where he leads Wil Swindler's Elevenet, the modern bop quintet GoodRattle, and the Wil Swindler Quartet. In addition to his own bands, he is an active performer with the Peter Sommer Septet, Al Hood's H2 Big Band, the Colorado Symphony, the Ben Markley Big Band, the Colorado Jazz Orchestra, The Annie Booth Big Band and many more.

In addition to receiving IAJE's Gil Evans Fellowship in 2008, Wil has completed numerous commissions from jazz ensembles, military bands, and symphony

orchestras around the world. Wil has four CDs available under his own name, Space Bugs (OA2 Records 2022), Universe B (OA2 Records 2010), the Right Riot (2014) with Goodrattle, and Chamber Jazz Ensemble (NohJoh Music 2006), and can be heard on numerous other albums including Ingrid Michaelson's Songs for the Season, Ben Markley's Clockwise and Ari's Funhouse (with Ari Hoenig), Steve Owen's Stand Up Eight, Peter Sommer's Soulful Songs and Spirits and Happy-Go-Lucky-Locals, Al Hood/Dave Hansen's You're It, Bob Washut's Journey to Knowhere, and David Caffey's Enter Autumn and All in One. Wil is a Senior Instructor of Music and the Director of Jazz Bands at Colorado State University.

Originally from Central Texas, Wil began studying music at age five, and picked up the saxophone at age nine. He earned a B.M. in Jazz Studies from the University of North Texas in 2001 where he played in, composed for, and recorded with the 1:00 Lab Band. While at North Texas, he studied with Jim Riggs, Paris Rutherford, Neil Slater, and others. In 2000 he attended the Henry Mancini Institute on a full scholarship from BMI, and received a commission the following year from HMI for a piece premiered at the Hollywood Bowl in Los Angeles. In 2001, Wil relocated to New York City, where he played with Toshiko Akiyoshi and Bill Warfield's NY Fusion Ensemble, among others. During his time in N.Y., Wil studied saxophone with Dave Pietro and composition with Michael Abene and Jim McNeely as a member of the BMI Jazz Composers Workshop. Mr. Swindler has lived in Colorado since 2006 with his wife April Johannesen and daughter Annika.Botti, LA Philharmonic, Feist, Sting, Dr. Dre, Mariah Carey, Lady Gaga, Fallout Boy, Burt Bacharach, Bill Holman, The Ojays, Jill Scott, Christina Aguilera, The Today Show, NPR, PBS, Disney, and more.

Dr. Joseph L. Jefferson is an award-winning educator that is currently the Associate Professor of Trombone/ Euphonium and Director of Jazz Studies at Southeast Missouri State University. At the 13th Annual Jazz Education Network Conference, Dr. Jefferson was awarded the 2022 Ellis Marsalis, Jr. Jazz Educator of the Year. As a soloist, chamber musician, sideman, educator, and adjudicator, Joseph maintains an active schedule in Classical, Jazz, and Commercial musical settings. Dr. Jefferson has been an invited guest artist and presenter at the International Trombone Festival, Jazz Education Network Conference, Darkwater Festival, Washington State Music Educators

Association Conference, Louisiana Music Educators Association Conference, Jazz Institute of Chicago, NAfME – Eastern Division Conference, International Horn Symposium, Reno Jazz Festival – University of Nevada, Reno, University of Evansville Brass & Percussion Day, Mt. Hood Jazz Festival, Weber State University, and Mineral Area College.

As a performer, Dr. Jefferson has shared the stage with a variety of groups and artists such as Vanessa Williams, Jennifer Wharton, Sean Jones, Andre Hayward, John Fedchock, The Colour of Music Orchestra, Paducah Symphony, The Irish Tenors, The Cab Calloway Orchestra, Zoltan Kiss (Mnozil Brass), Randy Brecker, Jae Sinnett, Mike Berkowitz, Christopher Bill, and international R&B artists Dwele and Raheem Devaughn among others. Internationally, Dr. Jefferson has also had performing and teaching residencies in Bermuda and Asia at the College of Music, Mahidol University in Nakhon Pathom, Thailand.

Dr. Jefferson has earned degrees from Norfolk State (B.M), Shenandoah Conservatory (M.M.), and West Virginia University (D.M.A.) under the tutelage of esteemed faculty; including, Dr. Keith Jackson, Dr. Wayne Wells, Dr. Mike Hall, and Mr. Paul Adams. He has also received instruction from Joseph Alessi, Andre Hayward, Amanda Stewart, Vincent Gardner, and Dr. Natalie Mannix.

Dr. Joseph L. Jefferson maintains his connection with the larger community of musicians and educators through his membership in Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Kappa Psi National Honorary Band Fraternity Inc., Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc., Jazz Education Network, International Trombone Association, NAfME (Southwestern Division Representative), Texas Music Educators Association, and the College Music Society. In 2021, Joseph was appointed the Jazz Content Editor for the Historical Brass Society. Additionally, Dr. Jefferson has served as a clinician/consultant for Jazz at Lincoln Center. Joseph is an S.E. Shires and Giddings Mouthpieces Performing Artist.

Preston Pierce is a Band Director at Plano West Senior High School in Plano Texas. His duties include directing the Wind Symphony, Jazz Orchestra, Jazz Band, Jazz Small Groups, assisting with the Marching Band, and coordinating the jazz program for the Plano West Cluster. He is a past President of the Texas Jazz Educators Association (TJEA) and currently serves on the board.

The Plano West Jazz Orchestra is a four-time finalist in Jazz at Lincoln Center's Essentially Ellington Competition and Festival in New York City in 2022, 2021, 2020, and 2017. Since 2020, the Plano West Jazz program has won a combined 14 DownBeat Student Music Awards in the annual competitions. In 2022 & 2018 the Jazz Orchestra was selected to perform at the Jazz Education

Network Conference (JEN). The Plano West Jazz Orchestra was also selected as the 2016 TMEA Invited High School Jazz Ensemble. While teaching in Plano, his students have earned spots in NYO Jazz, The Next Generation Jazz Orchestra, Vail Jazz Workshop, Jazz at Lincoln Center's Summer Jazz Academy (SJA), named National YoungArts winners in jazz, Music for All-Jazz Band of America, selected to tour in the NEA/Herbie Hancock Institute All-Star Peer-to-Peer Jazz Sextet, and have consistently earned spots in the TMEA All-State Jazz Ensembles. In 2017 the Plano West Jazz program was selected by the Herbie Hancock Institute of Jazz (formerly known as the Thelonious Monk Institute of Jazz) to take part in a new initiative that supports the jazz program by providing educational materials, clinicians, guest artists, and performance opportunities.



Donna Wickham earned a degree in vocal performance and a Masters in conducting from the University of Denver. While she was studying classical music in school, she was allowed to perform with the jazz ensembles, took a lot of private jazz lessons, and was regularly singing jazz. Right after she graduated, the vocal jazz instructor at Lamont took a sabbatical. Donna was hired to fill in for that year, and then stayed on to head the vocal jazz program at the University of Denver. "My students are brilliant and I am in love with them. It excites me to help them. I teach my students all of the things that jazz instrumentalists learn, and that there is no limit to singing."

Wickham, who recorded previously as a classical choral musician and a background singer, created her debut jazz recording, Myth and Memory, partly as a result of her collaborations with the great pianist Art Lande.

She formed the Firesign Vocal Quartet with three of her best friends from the choral world. The group explores new approaches to classical choral music and has performed new music concerts at colleges. She also sings with St. Martin's Chamber Choir in Denver and performs with the DU faculty jazz combo.

Donna Wickham says "For the future I plan to keep on searching for musical soul mates and creating meaningful and original music."







Aving amassed 21 Grammy nominations, four Grammy wins and three Emmy wins, Gordon Goodwin is the most decorated big band leader in the 21st century. He is leader of Gordon Goodwin's Big Phat Band, an internationally known ensemble with a reputation as one of the most exciting large ensembles in jazz. The BPB has released eight critically acclaimed records, including Life in the Bubble, which garnered four Grammy Nominations, and won the Grammy for "Best Large Ensemble Album." Their most recent release is The Gordian Knot which is rapidly securing its status as both a critical and popular hit.

Gordon's composing for film and television has garnered him three Emmy Awards. He has written and worked with artists like Ray Charles, Christina Aguilera, Johnny Mathis, John Williams, Natalie Cole, David Foster, Sarah Vaughan, Mel Torme, Leslie Odom Jr, Idina Menzel, and Quincy Jones, to name a few. His charts are played all over the world, and along with his method books and CDs, have been a robust source of inspiration and learning for thousands of young musicians. Goodwin is the host of a popular new radio program called "Phat Tracks with Gordon Goodwin," airing weekends on KJAZZ, America's jazz and blues station. His work can be heard on the recent PIXAR film Incredibles 2.

essentially **ELLINGTON**

The Essentially Ellington High School Jazz Band Program (EE) is unique among educational resources for high school jazz bands. Each year, Jazz at Lincoln Center (JALC) transcribes, publishes, and distributes charts by Duke Ellington and other seminal big band composers and arrangers, along with additional educational materials to bands in the U.S., Canada and American schools abroad. Beyond providing these charts, EE also supports its members throughout the school year with a variety of initiatives including teaching guides, the Essentially Ellington website, newsletters, a student composition contest, and professional feedback of student performances of the charts. Schools that join the program are eligible for participation in noncompetitive regional festivals and also have the option to submit recordings for the national Essentially Ellington High School Jazz Band Competition & Festival held annually in New York City at Frederick P. Rose Hall, the home of Jazz at Lincoln Center. Fifteen bands are selected as finalists and, to prepare, each finalist band receives an in-school workshop in their community led by a JALC clinician. The Competition & Festival culminates in a three-day festival in May for the finalist bands, including workshops, rehearsals, jam sessions, and performances. The three top-placing bands perform an evening concert with Wynton Marsalis and the Jazz at Lincoln Center Orchestra.

Since 1995, over 846,000 students have participated in Essentially Ellington. To date, more than 280,000 copies of 150 previously unavailable scores have been distributed to more than 5,300 schools internationally. In 2006, Essentially Ellington piloted noncompetitive, education-focused Regional festivals in an effort to reach more bands and provide the opportunity to perform Ellington's music and receive professional feedback from JALC clinicians and other jazz professionals in their own backyard.

Festival Directors



DR. JOSHUA R. MIETZ — Executive Director

Joshua R. Mietz, D.M.A. serves as the executive director of the Kinser Jazz Festival as well as the instructor of woodwinds at Casper College. He conducts the Casper College Jazz Ensemble, teaches applied clarinet and saxophone as well as jazz improvisation, The History of Blues, Jazz and Rock, and coaches the Casper College Clarinet and Saxophone choirs. Mietz was born in Upstate New York, and went to high school in Alamosa, Colorado. He earned a music degree in clarinet performance from the University of Colorado Boulder, an M.M. degree in clarinet performance from the University of Montana–Missoula, and a D.M.A. degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. His graduate degrees both featured emphases in instrumental

conducting and his doctoral document analyzed David Maslanka's "Desert Roads" from the viewpoint of a clarinetist and also a conductor. During the summer of 2015, he taught as a guest lecturer and performer at the University of Ludwigsburg in Baden-Württemberg, Germany. Prior to arriving in Casper in the fall of 2014, Mietz taught applied clarinet and saxophone at Fort Lewis and San Juan Colleges near Durango, Colorado. He is an active member of ICA, NASA, CMS, NaFME, and WJE. In his spare time, Mietz enjoys baking bread, backpacking, and running in the mountains.



CYNTHIA HARRISON — Graphic Design Instructor

Cynthia Harrison is instructor and creator of the graphic design curriculum at Casper College. She had been an art director in the Twin Cities since 1994, specializing in art directing catalogs, direct mail, point-of-purchase, and promotional material. She received her B.F.A. in communication from the College of Visual Arts and M.F.A. in graphic design from the University of Minnesota. Formerly she has taught at Brown College, St. Catherine University, the Art

Institute International Minnesota, and the University of Minnesota.
